#### 1 Samuel 12:23

# **Comment**

This *Mitzvah* and the others referenced above are what is known as "intercession." What they have in common is praying for others rather than for ourselves. There are similarities and apparent repetitions among them, but they are individually listed because the verses that support each of them are worded somewhat differently.
